1. Benefit (noun)

- Defination: An advantage or profit gained from something.
- Synonyms: advantage, gain, profit
- Antonyms: disadvantage, loss, harm
- Example: One of the benefits of exercise is improved sleep.

2. Bias (noun)

- Defination: Prejudice in favor of or against one thing, person, or group compared with another, usually in a way that's considered to be unfair.
- Synonyms: prejudice, partiality, favoritism
- Antonyms: fairness, impartiality, objectivity
- Example: The news report showed a clear bias against the candidate.

3. Brief (adjective)

- Defination: Of short duration.
- Synonyms: short, concise, terse
- Antonyms: long, extended, lengthy
- Example: The meeting was brief and to the point.

4. Broaden (verb)

- Defination: Enlarge (something) in width.
- Synonyms: widen, expand, increase
- Antonyms: narrow, decrease, reduce
- Example: Travel can broaden your perspective.

5. Bureaucracy (noun)

- Defination: A system of government or business that has many complicated rules and procedures.
- Synonyms: administration, government, red tape
- Example: The company is weighed down by bureaucracy.

6. Barren (adjective)

- Defination: Too poor to produce vegetation.
- Synonyms: infertile, unproductive, desolate
- Antonyms: fertile, productive, lush
- Example: The land was barren and desolate.

7. Bewilder (verb)

- Defination: Cause (someone) to become perplexed and confused.
- Synonyms: confuse, puzzle, baffle
- Antonyms: clarify, explain, enlighten



- Example: The complex instructions bewildered me.

8. Bolster (verb)

- Defination: Support or strengthen.
- Synonyms: support, strengthen, reinforce
- Antonyms: weaken, undermine, diminish
- Example: She tried to bolster his confidence.

9. Boundary (noun)

- Defination: A line that marks the limits of an area.
- Synonyms: border, frontier, edge
- Example: The river forms the boundary between the two countries.

10. Brave (adjective)

- Defination: Ready to face and endure danger or pain; showing courage.
- Synonyms: courageous, fearless, valiant
- Antonyms: cowardly, timid, fearful
- Example: He was a brave soldier.

11. Blatant (adjective)

- Defination: Done openly and unashamedly; obvious.
- Synonyms: obvious, flagrant, glaring
- Antonyms: subtle, inconspicuous, covert
- Example: A blatant attempt to bribe the official.

12. Believable (adjective)

- Defination: Capable of being believed; plausible.
- Synonyms: credible, plausible, convincing
- Antonyms: unbelievable, implausible, doubtful
- Example: The story was not believable.

13. Benevolent (adjective)

- Defination: Well meaning and kindly.
- Synonyms: kind, compassionate, generous
- Antonyms: malevolent, cruel, selfish
- Example: A benevolent dictator.

14. Beseech (verb)

- Defination: Ask (someone) urgently and fervently to do something; implore.
- Synonyms: beg, implore, entreat



- Antonyms: command, demand, order
- Example: They beseeched him to stay.

15. Bipartisan (adjective)

- Defination: Involving the agreement or cooperation of two political parties that usually oppose each other.
- Synonyms: nonpartisan, coalition, united
- Antonyms: partisan, factional, divisive
- Example: A bipartisan agreement on education reform.

16. Bleak (adjective)

- Defination: Without hope or encouragement; depressing.
- Synonyms: desolate, grim, depressing
- Antonyms: bright, promising, optimistic
- Example: The future looked bleak.

17. Blunder (noun)

- Defination: A stupid or careless mistake.
- Synonyms: mistake, error, gaffe
- Antonyms: accuracy, perfection, success
- Example: He made a terrible blunder.

18. Boisterous (adjective)

- Defination: Noisy, energetic, and cheerful; rowdy.
- Synonyms: rowdy, lively, energetic
- Antonyms: calm, quiet, restrained
- Example: A boisterous crowd.

19. Bombastic (adjective)

- Defination: High-sounding but with little meaning; inflated.
- Synonyms: pompous, inflated, pretentious
- Antonyms: humble, subtle, understated
- Example: Bombastic rhetoric.

20. Boom (noun)

- Defination: A period of great prosperity or rapid economic growth.
- Synonyms: prosperity, growth, expansion
- Antonyms: recession, decline, slump
- Example: The economic boom of the 1990s.

21. Burgeoning (adjective)



- Defination: Beginning to grow or increase rapidly; flourishing.
- Synonyms: flourishing, thriving, expanding
- Antonyms: declining, shrinking, waning
- Example: A burgeoning population.

22. Bystander (noun)

- Defination: A person who is present at an event or incident but does not take part.
- Synonyms: onlooker, observer, witness
- Antonyms: participant, involved, actor
- Example: The bystanders watched the fight.

23. Bankruptcy (noun)

- Defination: The state of being completely lacking in a particular quality or value.
- Synonyms: insolvency, failure, liquidation
- Antonyms: solvency, profitability, success
- Example: The company declared bankruptcy.

24. Bargain (noun)

- Defination: An agreement between parties regarding a transaction.
- Synonyms: agreement, deal, contract
- Antonyms: disagreement, quarrel, dispute
- Example: She struck a bargain with the vendor.

25. Barrier (noun)

- Defination: A circumstance or obstacle that keeps people or things apart or prevents progress.
- Synonyms: obstacle, impediment, hindrance
- Antonyms: aid, assistance, advantage
- Example: Language differences are a barrier to communication.

26. Bestow (verb)

- Defination: Confer or present (an honor, right, or gift).
- Synonyms: grant, give, confer
- Antonyms: withhold, take, deprive
- Example: The university bestowed an honorary degree on her.

27. Bifurcate (verb)

- Defination: Divide into two branches or forks.
- Synonyms: divide, split, fork
- Antonyms: join, merge, unite
- Example: The road bifurcated into two paths.



28. Bilateral (adjective)

- Defination: Having two sides.
- Synonyms: two-sided, mutual, reciprocal
- Antonyms: unilateral, one-sided, independent
- Example: A bilateral agreement between two countries.

29. Blemish (noun)

- Defination: A small mark or flaw that spoils the appearance of something.
- Synonyms: flaw, imperfection, defect
- Antonyms: perfection, flawlessness, beauty
- Example: A blemish on her skin.

30. Bond (noun)

- Defination: Something that unites two or more people or things.
- Synonyms: connection, tie, link
- Antonyms: separation, division, detachment
- Example: The bond between mother and child.

31. Balance (noun)

- Defination: An even distribution of weight enabling someone or something to remain upright and steady.
- Synonyms: equilibrium, stability, steadiness
- Antonyms: imbalance, instability, unevenness
- Example: She lost her balance and fell.

32. Basic (adjective)

- Defination: Forming an essential foundation or starting point; fundamental.
- Synonyms: fundamental, essential, primary
- Antonyms: advanced, complex, sophisticated
- Example: Basic human rights.

33. Bear (verb)

- Defination: Endure (an ordeal or difficulty).
- Synonyms: endure, tolerate, withstand
- Antonyms: avoid, evade, escape
- Example: She had to bear the pain.

34. Becoming (adjective)

- Defination: Looking good on someone; attractive.
- Synonyms: attractive, flattering, suitable



- Antonyms: unflattering, unsuitable, unbecoming
- Example: That dress is very becoming on you.

35. Beget (verb)

- Defination: (Typically of a man) bring (a child) into existence by the process of reproduction.
- Synonyms: father, produce, generate
- Antonyms: abort, destroy, eliminate
- Example: He beget a son.

36. Belie (verb)

- Defination: (Of an appearance) fail to give a true notion or impression of (something); disguise or contradict.
- Synonyms: contradict, disguise, conceal
- Antonyms: reveal, expose, uncover
- Example: His calm face belied the turmoil within.

37. Belligerent (adjective)

- Defination: Hostile and aggressive.
- Synonyms: hostile, aggressive, combative
- Antonyms: peaceful, friendly, amiable
- Example: A belligerent attitude.

38. Benign (adjective)

- Defination: Gentle and kindly.
- Synonyms: gentle, kindly, harmless
- Antonyms: malignant, harmful, dangerous
- Example: A benign old man.

39. Besmirch (verb)

- Defination: Damage the reputation of (someone or something) in the opinion of others.
- Synonyms: tarnish, damage, sully
- Antonyms: honor, respect, praise
- Example: He besmirched her reputation.

40. Bias (noun)

- Defination: Inclination or prejudice for or against one person or group, especially in a way considered to be unfair.
- Synonyms: prejudice, favoritism, partiality
- Antonyms: fairness, impartiality, objectivity
- Example: The judge showed bias against the defendant.



41. Bibliophile (noun)

- Defination: A person who collects or has a great love of books.
- Synonyms: bookworm, book lover, book collector
- Antonyms: misologue, book hater, ignoramus
- Example: She is a true bibliophile.

42. Bizarre (adjective)

- Defination: Very strange or unusual, especially so as to cause interest or amusement.
- Synonyms: strange, unusual, peculiar
- Antonyms: normal, ordinary, typical
- Example: A bizarre situation.

43. Bland (adjective)

- Defination: Lacking strong features or characteristics and therefore uninteresting.
- Synonyms: tasteless, uninteresting, dull
- Antonyms: flavorful, interesting, exciting
- Example: The soup was rather bland.

44. Blight (noun)

- Defination: A thing that spoils or damages something.
- Synonyms: affliction, scourge, plague
- Antonyms: blessing, benefit, boon
- Example: Urban blight.

45. Bode (verb)

- Defination: Be an omen of (a particular outcome).
- Synonyms: portend, foreshadow, augur
- Antonyms: belie, contradict, negate
- Example: These changes do not bode well for the future.

46. Bogus (adjective)

- Defination: Not genuine or true; fake.
- Synonyms: fake, false, fraudulent
- Antonyms: genuine, authentic, real
- Example: A bogus claim.

47. Boon (noun)

- Defination: A thing that is helpful or beneficial.
- Synonyms: benefit, advantage, blessing
- Antonyms: disadvantage, drawback, curse



- Example: The rain was a boon to the farmers.

48. Brash (adjective)

- Defination: Self-assertive in a rude, noisy, or overbearing way.
- Synonyms: audacious, impudent, cheeky
- Antonyms: timid, meek, submissive
- Example: His brash attitude offended many.

49. Brevity (noun)

- Defination: Concise and exact use of words in writing or speech.
- Synonyms: conciseness, terseness, succinctness
- Antonyms: verbosity, loquacity, wordiness
- Example: The speech was admired for its brevity.

50. Buoyant (adjective)

- Defination: Able to stay afloat or rise to the top of a liquid or air.
- Synonyms: floating, afloat, light
- Antonyms: sinking, heavy, submerged
- Example: The boat was buoyant in the water.

51. Baffle (verb)

- Defination: To bewilder or perplex.
- Synonyms: perplex, bewilder, confound
- Antonyms: clarify, explain, elucidate
- Example: The complex puzzle baffled even the experts.

52. Banal (adjective)

- Defination: Lacking in originality as to be obvious and boring.
- Synonyms: trite, hackneyed, clichéd
- Antonyms: original, fresh, innovative
- Example: Banal plotlines plague many movies.

53. Barrage (noun)

- Defination: A concentrated artillery bombardment.
- Synonyms: bombardment, onslaught, deluge
- Antonyms: dearth, lack, paucity
- Example: The troops faced a barrage of heavy fire.

54. Bastion (noun)

- Defination: A fortified place or position.



- Synonyms: fortress, stronghold, bulwark
- Antonyms: weak point, vulnerable spot, breach
- Example: The castle acted as a bastion against invaders.

55. Bawdy (adjective)

- Defination: Dealing with sexual matters in a comical way; humorously indecent.
- Synonyms: risqué, indecent, vulgar
- Antonyms: decent, moral, pure
- Example: The play was known for its bawdy jokes.

56. Beatific (adjective)

- Defination: Radiating bliss.
- Synonyms: blissful, joyful, radiant
- Antonyms: miserable, sad, unhappy
- Example: She had a beatific smile on her face.

57. Bedlam (noun)

- Defination: A scene of uproar and confusion.
- Synonyms: chaos, uproar, pandemonium
- Antonyms: order, peace, tranquility
- Example: The market was a scene of bedlam.

58. Behemoth (noun)

- Defination: A huge or monstrous creature.
- Synonyms: giant, monster, colossus
- Antonyms: dwarf, miniature, small fry
- Example: The corporation was a behemoth in its industry.

59. Bequest (noun)

- Defination: Something left to someone in a will.
- Synonyms: inheritance, legacy, endowment
- Antonyms: loss, privation, debt
- Example: He received a bequest of a large sum of money.

60. Bereft (adjective)

- Defination: Deprived of or lacking something.
- Synonyms: deprived, lacking, devoid
- Antonyms: full, abundant, replete
- Example: The forest was bereft of trees.



61. Berserk (adjective)

- Defination: Out of control with anger or excitement; wild or frenzied.
- Synonyms: frenzied, hysterical, maniacal
- Antonyms: calm, peaceful, serene
- Example: He went berserk and started smashing things.

62. Betroth (verb)

- Defination: Enter into a formal agreement to marry.
- Synonyms: engaged, promised, pledged
- Antonyms: divorced, separated, unpledged
- Example: They were betrothed at a young age.

63. Beverage (noun)

- Defination: A drink other than water.
- Synonyms: drink, liquid, refreshment
- Antonyms: food, solid, sustenance
- Example: She ordered a refreshing beverage.

64. Bibliolatry (noun)

- Defination: Excessive reverence for books.
- Synonyms: book worship, book veneration, book adoration
- Antonyms: book hatred, disrespect for books, bibliophobia
- Example: His bibliolatry was evident in his extensive collection.

65. Bigot (noun)

- Defination: A person who is intolerant toward those holding different opinions.
- Synonyms: zealot, partisan, sectarian
- Antonyms: tolerant person, liberal person, open-minded individual
- Example: The town was divided by bigots on both sides.

66. Billow (verb)

- Defination: (Of fabric) fill with air and swell outward.
- Synonyms: swell, inflate, balloon
- Antonyms: deflate, shrink, collapse
- Example: The sails billowed in the wind.

67. Biped (noun)

- Defination: An animal that uses two legs for walking.
- Synonyms: two-legged creature, bimanous, dipedal
- Antonyms: quadruped, four-legged creature, multiped



- Example: Humans are bipeds.

68. Bivouac (noun)

- Defination: A temporary camp without tents or cover.
- Synonyms: camp, encampment, lean-to
- Antonyms: permanent camp, fortified base, citadel
- Example: The soldiers spent the night in a bivouac.

69. Blanch (verb)

- Defination: Make white or pale by extracting color.
- Synonyms: whiten, pale, fade
- Antonyms: redden, darken, color
- Example: She blanched at the sight of the accident.

70. Blandishment (noun)

- Defination: A flattering or pleasing statement or action used to persuade someone gently to do something.
- Synonyms: flattery, adulation, ingratiation
- Antonyms: criticism, reproach, disapproval
- Example: The salesman used blandishments to close the deal.

71. Blasphemy (noun)

- Defination: The act or offense of speaking sacrilegiously about God or sacred things.
- Synonyms: profanity, sacrilege, impiety
- Antonyms: piety, reverence, devotion
- Example: He was accused of blasphemy.

72. Blithe (adjective)

- Defination: Showing a casual and cheerful indifference considered to be callous or improper.
- Synonyms: nonchalant, carefree, insouciant
- Antonyms: concerned, worried, anxious
- Example: He showed a blithe disregard for the rules.

73. Bloated (adjective)

- Defination: Swollen with fluid or gas.
- Synonyms: swollen, inflated, puffed up
- Antonyms: deflated, shrunken, flat
- Example: Her stomach felt bloated.

74. Bodega (noun)

- Defination: A small Hispanic grocery store, especially in an urban area.



- Synonyms: corner store, grocery store, deli
- Antonyms: supermarket, hypermarket, warehouse store
- Example: He bought milk at the corner bodega.

75. Bole (noun)

- Defination: The trunk of a tree.
- Synonyms: trunk, stem, stock
- Antonyms: branch, limb, twig
- Example: The bole of the oak was massive.

76. Bonanza (noun)

- Defination: A situation or event that creates a sudden increase in wealth, good fortune, or profits.
- Synonyms: windfall, jackpot, gold mine
- Antonyms: loss, disaster, failure
- Example: The discovery of gold led to a bonanza for the town.

77. Bonhomie (noun)

- Defination: Cheerful friendliness; geniality.
- Synonyms: geniality, amiability, cordiality
- Antonyms: hostility, reserve, coldness
- Example: His bonhomie made him popular.

78. Botch (verb)

- Defination: Carry out (a task) badly or carelessly.
- Synonyms: spoil, ruin, mishandle
- Antonyms: perfect, excel, master
- Example: He botched the repair job.

79. Bourgeois (adjective)

- Defination: Characteristic of the middle class, typically with reference to its perceived materialistic values or conventional attitudes.
- Synonyms: middle-class, conventional, materialistic
- Antonyms: proletarian, working-class, unconventional
- Example: He had bourgeois tastes.

80. Bowdlerize (verb)

- Defination: Remove material that is considered improper or offensive from (a text or account), especially with the result that it becomes weaker or less effective.
- Synonyms: censor, expurgate, sanitize
- Antonyms: unexpurgated, unaltered, unabridged
- Example: The book was bowdlerized for young readers.



81. Braggadocio (noun)

- Defination: Boastful or arrogant behavior.
- Synonyms: boasting, bragging, swagger
- Antonyms: humility, modesty, shyness
- Example: His braggadocio was tiresome.

82. Bravado (noun)

- Defination: A bold manner or a show of boldness intended to impress or intimidate.
- Synonyms: boldness, showiness, ostentation
- Antonyms: timidity, cowardice, fear
- Example: He adopted an air of bravado.

83. Brew (verb)

- Defination: Make (beer or other liquor) by steeping, boiling, and fermentation.
- Synonyms: ferment, infuse, steep
- Antonyms: consume, drink, ingest
- Example: He brewed his own beer.

84. Brindle (adjective)

- Defination: Having a brownish or tawny coat with streaks of other color.
- Synonyms: streaked, dappled, mottled
- Antonyms: solid-colored, unmarked, uniform
- Example: The dog was brindle.

85. Broach (verb)

- Defination: Raise (a sensitive or difficult subject) for discussion.
- Synonyms: introduce, raise, mention
- Antonyms: avoid, evade, ignore
- Example: He hesitated to broach the subject.

86. Brouhaha (noun)

- Defination: A noisy and overexcited reaction or response to something.
- Synonyms: uproar, commotion, fuss
- Antonyms: calm, peace, quiet
- Example: The incident caused a brouhaha in the media.

87. Brusque (adjective)

- Defination: Abrupt or offhand in speech or manner.
- Synonyms: curt, abrupt, blunt
- Antonyms: gracious, polite, courteous



- Example: He was known for his brusque demeanor.

88. Buffoon (noun)

- Defination: A ridiculous but amusing person.
- Synonyms: clown, fool, jester
- Antonyms: sage, wise person, serious individual
- Example: He played the role of a buffoon.

89. Bulwark (noun)

- Defination: A defensive wall.
- Synonyms: rampart, fortification, defense
- Antonyms: weakness, vulnerability, opening
- Example: The city was protected by a bulwark.

90. Bumpkin (noun)

- Defination: An unsophisticated or socially awkward person from the countryside.
- Synonyms: yokel, rustic, hayseed
- Antonyms: sophisticate, urbane, cosmopolitan
- Example: He felt like a bumpkin in the big city.

91. Beguile (verb)

- Defination: Charm or enchant (someone), sometimes in a deceptive way.
- Synonyms: charm, enchant, deceive
- Antonyms: repel, offend, disenchant
- Example: He beguiled her with flattery.

92. Behemoth (noun)

- Defination: Something enormous in size or power.
- Synonyms: giant, colossus, mammoth
- Antonyms: dwarf, miniature, runt
- Example: The computer company is a behemoth in the industry.

93. Bane (noun)

- Defination: A cause of great distress or annoyance.
- Synonyms: scourge, curse, plague
- Antonyms: boon, blessing, advantage
- Example: The constant noise was the bane of his existence.

94. Bellicose (adjective)

- Defination: Demonstrating aggression and willingness to fight.



- Synonyms: aggressive, combative, warlike
- Antonyms: peaceful, amicable, conciliatory
- Example: His bellicose attitude got him into trouble.
