1. Jab (verb)

- Defination: To poke or push sharply and quickly with something pointed.
- Synonyms: poke, prod, thrust, lunge
- Antonyms: withdraw, retreat, pull, caress
- Example: He tried to jab the button repeatedly, but it was stuck.

2. Jacket (noun)

- Defination: An outer garment extending to the waist or hips, with sleeves and a fastening down the front.
- Synonyms: coat, blazer, anorak, windbreaker
- Antonyms: nudity, undress, bareness
- Example: She wore a warm jacket to protect herself from the cold.

3. Jaded (adjective)

- Defination: Tired, bored, or lacking enthusiasm, typically after having had too much of something.
- Synonyms: weary, fatigued, bored, blasé
- Antonyms: fresh, enthusiastic, eager, invigorated
- Example: After years of constant travel, she became jaded with exotic destinations.

4. Jagged (adjective)

- Defination: Having rough, sharp points protruding.
- Synonyms: sharp, pointed, serrated, uneven
- Antonyms: smooth, even, blunt, uniform
- Example: The jagged edges of the broken glass were dangerous.

5. Jail (noun)

- Defination: A place for the confinement of people accused or convicted of a crime.
- Synonyms: prison, detention center, cell, lockup
- Antonyms: freedom, liberty, release
- Example: He was sent to jail for a minor offense.

6. Jargon (noun)

- Defination: Special words or expressions that are used by a particular profession or group and are difficult for others to understand.
- Synonyms: argot, slang, cant, terminology
- Antonyms: standard language, plain speech, clear language
- Example: Avoid using too much technical jargon when explaining things to a general audience.

7. Jarring (adjective)

- Defination: Incongruous in a startling or unpleasant way; causing a physical or emotional shock.
- Synonyms: clashing, discordant, incongruous, grating



- Antonyms: harmonious, congruous, pleasing, smooth
- Example: The modern sculpture looked jarringly out of place in the ancient temple.

8. Jaundiced (adjective)

- Defination: Feeling or showing resentment, envy, or hostility.
- Synonyms: cynical, biased, prejudiced, resentful
- Antonyms: optimistic, impartial, fair, open-minded
- Example: After many disappointments, he viewed all new proposals with a jaundiced eye.

9. Jaunt (noun)

- Defination: A short excursion or journey for pleasure.
- Synonyms: trip, excursion, outing, stroll
- Antonyms: stay, residence, immobility
- Example: They took a leisurely jaunt to the countryside last weekend.

10. Jaunty (adjective)

- Defination: Having or expressing a lively, cheerful, and self-confident manner.
- Synonyms: lively, cheerful, sprightly, breezy
- Antonyms: subdued, dull, depressed, listless
- Example: He walked with a jaunty step, whistling a happy tune.

11. Jealous (adjective)

- Defination: Feeling or showing envy of someone or their achievements and possessions.
- Synonyms: envious, covetous, resentful, suspicious
- Antonyms: content, generous, trusting, admiring
- Example: She felt jealous of her friend's new car.

12. Jeer (verb)

- Defination: To make rude and mocking remarks, typically in a loud voice.
- Synonyms: mock, ridicule, taunt, scoff
- Antonyms: applaud, cheer, praise, compliment
- Example: The crowd began to jeer at the referee after the controversial decision.

13. Jejune (adjective)

- Defination: Naive, simplistic, and superficial; dry and uninteresting.
- Synonyms: puerile, simplistic, insipid, uninspired
- Antonyms: profound, mature, stimulating, sophisticated
- Example: The lecture was rather jejune, offering no new insights or profound thoughts.

14. Jeopardize (verb)



- Defination: Put (someone or something) into a situation in which there is a danger of loss, harm, or failure.
- Synonyms: endanger, imperil, threaten, risk
- Antonyms: protect, safeguard, secure, preserve
- Example: Smoking can seriously jeopardize your health.

15. Jeopardy (noun)

- Defination: Danger of loss, harm, or failure.
- Synonyms: peril, risk, danger, hazard
- Antonyms: safety, security, protection, safeguard
- Example: His career was in jeopardy after the scandal.

16. Jerk (verb)

- Defination: To pull or move with a sudden, sharp, quick motion.
- Synonyms: tug, pull, snatch, yank
- Antonyms: ease, smooth, slide, glide
- Example: He felt the fishing line jerk as a fish took the bait.

17. Jest (noun)

- Defination: A thing said or done for amusement; a joke.
- Synonyms: joke, witticism, prank, wisecrack
- Antonyms: seriousness, earnestness, truth, sincerity
- Example: He made a jest about his own clumsiness, making everyone laugh.

18. Jettison (verb)

- Defination: To throw or drop (something) from an aircraft or ship; to abandon or discard (something that is no longer wanted).
- Synonyms: discard, abandon, dump, relinquish
- Antonyms: retain, keep, preserve, acquire
- Example: The company decided to jettison outdated products to make way for new ones.

19. Jewel (noun)

- Defination: A precious stone, especially one used in jewelry.
- Synonyms: gem, precious stone, ornament, trinket
- Antonyms: junk, trash, worthless item
- Example: She wore a necklace with a beautiful emerald jewel.

20. Jibe (verb)

- Defination: (Informal) Be in agreement.
- Synonyms: agree, accord, concur, conform
- Antonyms: disagree, conflict, clash, contradict



- Example: His story didn't quite jibe with the facts presented by other witnesses.

21. Jiggle (verb)

- Defination: To move lightly and quickly up and down or side to side.
- Synonyms: shake, wiggle, wobble, jostle
- Antonyms: steady, still, stabilize
- Example: He had to jiggle the key in the lock before it would turn.

22. Jingoism (noun)

- Defination: Extreme patriotism, especially in the form of aggressive or warlike foreign policy.
- Synonyms: chauvinism, nationalism, xenophobia, belligerence
- Antonyms: internationalism, pacifism, globalism
- Example: The politician's speech was full of jingoism, inciting nationalistic fervor.

23. Jinx (noun)

- Defination: A person or thing that is believed to bring bad luck.
- Synonyms: curse, hex, spell, hoodoo
- Antonyms: blessing, charm, good luck, fortune
- Example: Some superstitious people believe that breaking a mirror is a jinx.

24. Jittery (adjective)

- Defination: Nervous or edgy.
- Synonyms: nervous, anxious, restless, apprehensive
- Antonyms: calm, relaxed, composed, tranquil
- Example: She felt jittery before her big presentation.

25. Job (noun)

- Defination: A paid position of regular employment.
- Synonyms: occupation, profession, work, post
- Antonyms: unemployment, idleness, leisure
- Example: She applied for a new job as a marketing manager.

26. Jocose (adjective)

- Defination: Playful or humorous.
- Synonyms: joking, witty, humorous, playful
- Antonyms: serious, solemn, grave, earnest
- Example: His jocose remarks lightened the mood in the room.

27. Jocund (adjective)

- Defination: Cheerful and lighthearted.



- Synonyms: merry, jovial, cheerful, blithe
- Antonyms: gloomy, melancholy, somber, morose
- Example: The jocund atmosphere of the festival was contagious.

28. Jog (verb)

- Defination: To run at a steady, gentle pace.
- Synonyms: run, trot, lope, amble
- Antonyms: sprint, dash, walk, rest
- Example: She goes for a short jog every morning to stay fit.

29. Joggle (verb)

- Defination: To shake slightly.
- Synonyms: nudge, wiggle, jolt, stir
- Antonyms: still, stabilize, fix
- Example: He tried to joggle the stuck drawer open.

30. Join (verb)

- Defination: Link, connect, or unite two or more things.
- Synonyms: connect, unite, link, combine
- Antonyms: separate, disconnect, detach, divide
- Example: They decided to join forces to complete the project faster.

31. Joint (adjective)

- Defination: Shared by or belonging to two or more; united or combined.
- Synonyms: shared, collective, mutual, common
- Antonyms: separate, individual, private, sole
- Example: The project was a joint effort between the two departments.

32. Jollity (noun)

- Defination: Lively and cheerful festivities.
- Synonyms: merriment, gaiety, cheerfulness, mirth
- Antonyms: sadness, gloom, melancholy, sorrow
- Example: The hall was filled with music and jollity during the celebration.

33. Jolly (adjective)

- Defination: Happy and cheerful.
- Synonyms: cheerful, merry, joyful, gleeful
- Antonyms: sad, glum, miserable, depressed
- Example: Santa Claus is often depicted as a jolly old man.



34. Jolt (verb)

- Defination: To push or shake (someone or something) abruptly and roughly.
- Synonyms: bump, shake, jar, startle
- Antonyms: smooth, soothe, calm, steady
- Example: The bus hit a pothole, jolting the passengers forward.

35. Jostle (verb)

- Defination: To push, elbow, or shove (someone) roughly in a crowd.
- Synonyms: shove, push, elbow, bump
- Antonyms: avoid, yield, retreat, give way
- Example: Shoppers jostled for position in the crowded store.

36. Journal (noun)

- Defination: A newspaper or magazine that deals with a particular subject or professional activity.
- Synonyms: periodical, magazine, paper, gazette
- Antonyms: fiction, tale, rumor
- Example: She published her research findings in a reputable scientific journal.

37. Journey (noun)

- Defination: An act of traveling from one place to another.
- Synonyms: trip, voyage, expedition, trek
- Antonyms: halt, stop, stay, residence
- Example: Their journey across the desert was long and arduous.

38. Jovial (adjective)

- Defination: Cheerful and friendly.
- Synonyms: merry, cheerful, genial, affable
- Antonyms: gloomy, morose, surly, sullen
- Example: He greeted everyone with a jovial smile and a handshake.

39. Joy (noun)

- Defination: A feeling of great pleasure and happiness.
- Synonyms: delight, pleasure, ecstasy, elation
- Antonyms: sorrow, misery, sadness, grief
- Example: The birth of their child brought them immense joy.

40. Joyful (adjective)

- Defination: Feeling, expressing, or causing great pleasure and happiness.
- Synonyms: happy, merry, cheerful, exuberant
- Antonyms: sad, unhappy, sorrowful, dismal



- Example: The atmosphere at the wedding was incredibly joyful.

41. Joyous (adjective)

- Defination: Full of happiness and joy.
- Synonyms: happy, delightful, festive, exultant
- Antonyms: sad, dismal, somber, melancholy
- Example: It was a truly joyous occasion for the whole family.

42. Jubilant (adjective)

- Defination: Feeling or expressing great happiness and triumph.
- Synonyms: exultant, triumphant, joyful, ecstatic
- Antonyms: dejected, sorrowful, despondent, gloomy
- Example: The fans were jubilant after their team won the championship.

43. Jubilation (noun)

- Defination: A feeling of great happiness and triumph.
- Synonyms: exhilaration, exultation, joy, triumph
- Antonyms: sorrow, despair, dejection, gloom
- Example: There was widespread jubilation in the streets after the victory.

44. Jubilee (noun)

- Defination: A special anniversary of an event, especially one for which a celebration is held.
- Synonyms: anniversary, celebration, festival, commemoration
- Antonyms: mourning, bereavement, remembrance (of loss)
- Example: The queen celebrated her diamond jubilee with a grand ceremony.

45. Judge (verb)

- Defination: To form an opinion or conclusion about.
- Synonyms: assess, evaluate, appraise, determine
- Antonyms: ignore, overlook, disregard, assume
- Example: It's important not to judge a book by its cover.

46. Judgment (noun)

- Defination: The ability to make considered decisions or come to sensible conclusions.
- Synonyms: discernment, sagacity, prudence, wisdom
- Antonyms: folly, imprudence, indiscretion, rashness
- Example: She showed excellent judgment in handling the crisis.

47. Judicial (adjective)

- Defination: Of, by, or appropriate to a court or judge.



- Synonyms: legal, forensic, court-related, juridical
- Antonyms: unlawful, illegal, arbitrary
- Example: The country has an independent judicial system.

48. Judiciary (noun)

- Defination: The judges of a country or state, considered collectively.
- Synonyms: magistracy, bench, court, legal system
- Antonyms: legislature, executive (branch), civilian population
- Example: The independence of the judiciary is crucial for justice.

49. Judicious (adjective)

- Defination: Having, showing, or done with good judgment or sense.
- Synonyms: wise, sensible, prudent, sagacious
- Antonyms: unwise, foolish, imprudent, rash
- Example: It was a judicious move to save money for retirement.

50. Jug (noun)

- Defination: A container with a handle and a lip, used for holding and pouring liquids.
- Synonyms: pitcher, carafe, ewer, flagon
- Antonyms: cup, glass, mug (individual serving containers)
- Example: She filled the jug with water and placed it on the table.

51. Juggernaut (noun)

- Defination: A huge, powerful, and overwhelming force or institution.
- Synonyms: leviathan, colossus, behemoth, steamroller
- Antonyms: dwarf, pipsqueak, weakling, impotence
- Example: The company had become a global marketing juggernaut, crushing its competitors.

52. Jumble (verb)

- Defination: To mix up in a confused or untidy way.
- Synonyms: disorder, muddle, mix, tangle
- Antonyms: organize, sort, arrange, order
- Example: All the papers were jumbled together on the desk.

53. Jumbo (adjective)

- Defination: Very large.
- Synonyms: huge, gigantic, enormous, massive
- Antonyms: tiny, miniature, petite, small
- Example: They bought a jumbo packet of crisps for the party.



54. Jump (verb)

- Defination: To propel oneself upward into the air by using one's leg and foot muscles.
- Synonyms: leap, spring, bound, vault
- Antonyms: fall, drop, descend, alight
- Example: The athlete managed to jump over the high bar.

55. Junction (noun)

- Defination: A point where two or more things are joined.
- Synonyms: intersection, crossroads, connection, convergence
- Antonyms: separation, divergence, split, disconnection
- Example: The accident occurred near the road junction.

56. Juncture (noun)

- Defination: A particular point in events or time.
- Synonyms: point, moment, stage, crossroad
- Antonyms: continuum, flow, progression
- Example: At this critical juncture, a guick decision is required.

57. Jungle (noun)

- Defination: An area of dense tropical forest, typically with thick undergrowth.
- Synonyms: forest, rainforest, wilderness, bush
- Antonyms: desert, tundra, urban area, clearing
- Example: They explored the dense jungle in search of rare species.

58. Junior (adjective)

- Defination: Of lower rank or status; younger.
- Synonyms: subordinate, inferior, lower-ranking, younger
- Antonyms: senior, superior, higher-ranking, older
- Example: He was a junior employee in the company.

59. Junk (noun)

- Defination: Discarded articles: rubbish.
- Synonyms: rubbish, trash, waste, debris
- Antonyms: treasure, valuables, assets, riches
- Example: The garage was full of old junk that needed to be thrown away.

60. Junket (noun)

- Defination: An extravagant trip or party, especially one taken by an official at public expense.
- Synonyms: excursion, spree, trip, voyage
- Antonyms: duty, work, obligation, staycation



- Example: Critics accused the politicians of taking a lavish junket at taxpayer expense.

61. Jurisdiction (noun)

- Defination: The official power to make legal decisions and judgments.
- Synonyms: authority, control, power, domain
- Antonyms: submission, subservience, impotence, lack of authority
- Example: The court ruled that it did not have jurisdiction over the international dispute.

62. Jurisprudence (noun)

- Defination: The theory or philosophy of law.
- Synonyms: law, legal theory, legal philosophy, legal science
- Antonyms: ignorance (of law), lawlessness, chaos
- Example: He specialized in the study of international jurisprudence and legal systems.

63. Jurist (noun)

- Defination: An expert in law.
- Synonyms: lawyer, legal scholar, judge, advocate
- Antonyms: layperson, novice (in law), non-expert
- Example: The esteemed jurist offered his opinion on the complex case.

64. Jury (noun)

- Defination: A body of people (typically 12) sworn to give a verdict in a legal case on the basis of evidence submitted to them in court.
- Synonyms: panel, arbiters, assessors, tribunal
- Antonyms: accused, defendant, plaintiff, witness
- Example: The jury deliberated for hours before reaching a verdict.

65. Just (adjective)

- Defination: Based on or behaving according to what is morally right and fair.
- Synonyms: fair, equitable, impartial, unbiased
- Antonyms: unfair, unjust, biased, prejudiced
- Example: The judge made a just decision after hearing both sides.

66. Justice (noun)

- Defination: Fairness in the way people are treated.
- Synonyms: fairness, equity, righteousness, impartiality
- Antonyms: injustice, unfairness, bias, prejudice
- Example: Everyone deserves to be treated with justice and equality.

67. Justifiable (adjective)

- Defination: Able to be shown to be right or reasonable; defensible.



- Synonyms: valid, defensible, legitimate, warranted
- Antonyms: unjustifiable, unwarranted, unacceptable, wrong
- Example: His anger was completely justifiable given the circumstances.

68. Justification (noun)

- Defination: The action of showing something to be right or reasonable.
- Synonyms: reason, explanation, vindication, defense
- Antonyms: condemnation, criticism, denial, refutation
- Example: He offered a detailed justification for his decision.

69. Justify (verb)

- Defination: To show or prove to be right or reasonable.
- Synonyms: validate, explain, warrant, vindicate
- Antonyms: condemn, disapprove, criticize, challenge
- Example: You need to justify your decision with solid arguments.

70. Justly (adverb)

- Defination: In a fair or equitable manner.
- Synonyms: fairly, equitably, rightly, deservedly
- Antonyms: unfairly, unjustly, wrongly, improperly
- Example: The prize was justly awarded to the most deserving candidate.

71. Juvenile (adjective)

- Defination: Of, for, or relating to young people.
- Synonyms: youthful, adolescent, immature, young
- Antonyms: adult, mature, aged, elderly
- Example: The juvenile justice system handles cases involving minors.

72. Juxtapose (verb)

- Defination: To place or deal with close together for contrasting effect.
- Synonyms: compare, contrast, place side-by-side, oppose
- Antonyms: separate, distance, integrate, blend
- Example: The artist chose to juxtapose bright colors with dark shades in her painting.

73. Juxtaposition (noun)

- Defination: The fact of two things being seen or placed close together with contrasting effect.
- Synonyms: contrast, comparison, proximity, collation
- Antonyms: separation, isolation, disparity
- Example: The juxtaposition of ancient ruins and modern skyscrapers was striking.



74. Jabber (verb)

- Defination: To talk rapidly and excitedly but with little sense.
- Synonyms: chatter, babble, prattle, gabble
- Antonyms: be silent, listen, articulate, speak clearly
- Example: He tends to jabber away when he's nervous.

75. Jangle (verb)

- Defination: To make or cause to make a ringing metallic sound.
- Synonyms: clink, clank, rattle, chime
- Antonyms: silence, quiet, muffle
- Example: The keys jangled loudly as he searched for the right one.

76. Jarringly (adverb)

- Defination: In a way that is incongruous in a startling or unpleasant manner.
- Synonyms: discordantly, unpleasantly, harshly, abruptly
- Antonyms: harmoniously, pleasantly, smoothly, gently
- Example: The new advertising campaign was jarringly different from their usual style.

77. Jerkily (adverb)

- Defination: With sudden, sharp, and often uneven movements.
- Synonyms: abruptly, spasmodically, choppily, unevenly
- Antonyms: smoothly, fluidly, steadily, gracefully
- Example: The old car moved jerkily down the rough road.

78. Jettisoned (adjective)

- Defination: Discarded or abandoned, typically to lighten a load or remove something unwanted.
- Synonyms: discarded, abandoned, dumped, expelled
- Antonyms: retained, kept, preserved, collected
- Example: The jettisoned cargo floated on the ocean surface.

79. Jigsaw (noun)

- Defination: A puzzle consisting of a picture printed on cardboard or wood and cut into many irregularly shaped interlocking pieces.
- Synonyms: puzzle, brain-teaser, conundrum, assemblage
- Antonyms: disarray, disorder, chaos, simplicity
- Example: They spent the evening working on a thousand-piece jigsaw puzzle.

80. Jinxed (adjective)

- Defination: Subject to bad luck or a jinx.
- Synonyms: cursed, unlucky, ill-fated, doomed



- Antonyms: blessed, lucky, favored, fortunate
- Example: He felt that his team was jinxed after losing three games in a row.

81. Jocular (adjective)

- Defination: Fond of or characterized by joking; humorous or playful.
- Synonyms: humorous, witty, facetious, playful
- Antonyms: serious, grave, solemn, earnest
- Example: He had a jocular personality and always enjoyed a good laugh.

82. Joviality (noun)

- Defination: The state or quality of being jovial; cheerfulness and friendliness.
- Synonyms: cheerfulness, merriment, geniality, gaiety
- Antonyms: gloom, moroseness, sadness, sullenness
- Example: The general mood of joviality made the party a great success.

83. Jubilantly (adverb)

- Defination: In a way that expresses great happiness and triumph.
- Synonyms: exultantly, triumphantly, joyfully, ecstatically
- Antonyms: dejectedly, sorrowfully, despondently, gloomily
- Example: The team celebrated jubilantly after winning the final match.

84. Judgemental (adjective)

- Defination: Having or displaying an excessively critical point of view.
- Synonyms: critical, censorious, disapproving, condemnatory
- Antonyms: accepting, tolerant, understanding, open-minded
- Example: She tried not to be too judgmental about other people's choices.

85. Jumpy (adjective)

- Defination: Nervous and apprehensive.
- Synonyms: nervous, anxious, restless, on edge
- Antonyms: calm, relaxed, composed, tranquil
- Example: The loud noise made him feel jumpy and anxious.

86. Jargonistic (adjective)

- Defination: Full of or characterized by jargon.
- Synonyms: technical, specialized, obscure, abstruse
- Antonyms: clear, plain, accessible, simple
- Example: The report was too jargonistic for the general public to understand.

87. Jalopy (noun)



- Defination: An old, dilapidated car.
- Synonyms: clunker, beater, wreck, old banger
- Antonyms: new car, luxury vehicle, sports car
- Example: He drove his old jalopy down the dusty road.

88. Janitor (noun)

- Defination: A person employed to look after a public building, performing cleaning and minor maintenance.
- Synonyms: caretaker, custodian, cleaner, superintendent
- Antonyms: manager, executive, proprietor, occupant
- Example: The janitor cleaned the school classrooms every evening.

89. Jackal (noun)

- Defination: A wild dog native to Africa and Asia, typically feeding on carrion, game, and fruit.
- Synonyms: canine, wild dog, scavenger, predator
- Antonyms: prey, domesticated animal, herbivore
- Example: The jackal howled under the desert moon.

90. Jam (verb)

- Defination: To squeeze or pack tightly into a space.
- Synonyms: crowd, pack, cram, stuff
- Antonyms: empty, clear, vacate, release
- Example: The train was jammed with commuters during rush hour.

91. Jape (noun)

- Defination: A practical joke; a trick.
- Synonyms: joke, prank, trick, hoax
- Antonyms: seriousness, earnestness, truth, sincerity
- Example: He was known for his harmless japes and playful teasing.

92. Jealousy (noun)

- Defination: A feeling of envy towards someone else's achievements or possessions, or suspicion that a loved one is being unfaithful.
- Synonyms: envy, covetousness, resentment, suspicion
- Antonyms: admiration, contentment, trust, generosity
- Example: Her professional success sparked jealousy among some colleagues.

93. Joggle (noun)

- Defination: A slight shake or jolt.
- Synonyms: shake, jolt, nudge, wobble
- Antonyms: stillness, steadiness, stability



- Example: He felt a slight joggle as the train started to move.

94. Jot (verb)

- Defination: To write something quickly and briefly.
- Synonyms: write, scribble, note, record
- Antonyms: elaborate, detail, ignore, erase
- Example: She decided to jot down some notes during the lecture.

95. Junta (noun)

- Defination: A military or political group that rules a country after taking power by force.
- Synonyms: regime, council, clique, dictatorship
- Antonyms: democracy, civilian government, elected body
- Example: The country was ruled by a military junta for several years following the coup.

96. Jut (verb)

- Defination: To extend out, up, or forward from a surface.
- Synonyms: project, protrude, stick out, bulge
- Antonyms: recede, withdraw, sink, depress
- Example: A rocky outcrop jutted out over the sea.

97. Jactitation (noun)

- Defination: A false boast or claim; restless tossing to and fro (especially due to illness).
- Synonyms: boasting, bragging, exaggeration, vaunting
- Antonyms: modesty, humility, understatement
- Example: His constant jactitation about his wealth eventually alienated his friends.

98. Jocosity (noun)

- Defination: The quality of being humorous or playful.
- Synonyms: humor, playfulness, drollery, waggishness
- Antonyms: seriousness, solemnity, gravity
- Example: His natural jocosity made him popular at parties.

99. Jocundity (noun)

- Defination: The state or quality of being cheerful and lighthearted.
- Synonyms: cheerfulness, merriment, mirth, gaiety

193. Jurisdictional-dispute (noun)

- Defination: A disagreement between two or more legal bodies over which has the authority to hear a case or implement laws.
- Synonyms: conflict of authority, legal conflict, power struggle, domain dispute
- Antonyms: agreement, harmony, cooperation (in jurisdiction)
- Example: A jurisdictional-dispute between the states delayed the case.

194. Justness (adverb)

- Defination: Used to emphasize that something is fair, right, or deserved (archaic or literary).
- Synonyms: fairly, rightly, deservedly, equitably
- Antonyms: unfairly, wrongly, undeservedly, unjustly
- Example: The king justness ruled with a firm but fair hand.

195. Juvenilism (noun)

- Defination: The state or characteristic of being juvenile; immaturity.
- Synonyms: immaturity, childishness, puerility, adolescence
- Antonyms: maturity, adulthood, sophistication, wisdom
- Example: His political arguments were often criticized for their juvenilism.
