1. Quash (verb)

- Defination: To reject or stop something, especially a legal decision, forcefully and completely.
- Synonyms: nullify, overturn, annul
- Antonyms: uphold, validate, confirm
- Example: The court decided to quash the conviction due to insufficient evidence.

2. Quell (verb)

- Defination: To suppress a feeling, fear, or rebellion, or to put an end to something, typically by force.
- Synonyms: suppress, subdue, crush
- Antonyms: incite, provoke, foment
- Example: The police were called in to quell the unrest among the protesters.

3. Quibble (verb)

- Defination: To argue or raise trivial objections about a minor point.
- Synonyms: nitpick, cavil, dispute
- Antonyms: agree, concur, accept
- Example: It's not worth quibbling over such a small detail when the main goal is clear.

4. Quotidian (adjective)

- Defination: Occurring every day; commonplace or ordinary.
- Synonyms: everyday, ordinary, mundane
- Antonyms: unusual, extraordinary, rare
- Example: For many, the quotidian routine of commuting to work is a tiresome necessity.

5. Quagmire (noun)

- Defination: A soft boggy area of land that gives way underfoot; a difficult, precarious, or entrapping situation.
- Synonyms: bog, mire, predicament
- Antonyms: solution, clarity, advantage
- Example: The project quickly descended into a quagmire of legal disputes and financial problems.

6. Quixotic (adjective)

- Defination: Exceedingly idealistic; unrealistic and impractical.
- Synonyms: idealistic, visionary, utopian
- Antonyms: realistic, pragmatic, sensible
- Example: His quixotic quest to save the ancient library seemed admirable but ultimately doomed.

7. Quandary (noun)

- Defination: A state of perplexity or uncertainty over what to do in a difficult situation.
- Synonyms: dilemma, predicament, plight



- Antonyms: certainty, resolution, solution
- Example: The manager was in a quandary about which employee to promote.

8. Query (verb)

- Defination: To ask a question, especially to express doubt or to request information.
- Synonyms: inquire, question, ask
- Antonyms: answer, respond, state
- Example: The student decided to guery the professor about the ambiguous assignment instructions.

9. Quota (noun)

- Defination: A fixed share of something that a person, group, or country is allocated or required to achieve.
- Synonyms: allocation, apportionment, limit
- Antonyms: unlimited, excess, surplus
- Example: Each salesperson has to meet a monthly sales quota to receive their bonus.

10. Quaint (adjective)

- Defination: Attractively unusual or old-fashioned.
- Synonyms: charming, picturesque, old-world
- Antonyms: modern, contemporary, ordinary
- Example: The quaint village, with its cobbled streets and thatched cottages, attracted many tourists.

11. Qualitative (adjective)

- Defination: Relating to or measuring the quality of something rather than its quantity.
- Synonyms: descriptive, subjective, interpretive
- Antonyms: quantitative, numerical, measurable
- Example: The research involved a qualitative analysis of customer feedback, focusing on opinions and experiences.

12. Quantitative (adjective)

- Defination: Relating to or measuring the quantity of something rather than its quality.
- Synonyms: numerical, statistical, measurable
- Antonyms: qualitative, descriptive, subjective
- Example: The study relies on quantitative data, such as sales figures and demographic statistics.

13. Quicken (verb)

- Defination: To make or become quicker; to stimulate, hasten, or revive.
- Synonyms: accelerate, expedite, hasten
- Antonyms: slow, impede, delay
- Example: The unexpected news seemed to quicken her pulse and heighten her senses.



14. Quietude (noun)

- Defination: A state of stillness, calmness, and quiet.
- Synonyms: tranquility, serenity, calmness
- Antonyms: commotion, agitation, turmoil
- Example: She sought the quietude of the countryside to escape the city's noise.

15. Quintessential (adjective)

- Defination: Representing the most perfect or typical example of a quality or class.
- Synonyms: exemplary, classic, archetypal
- Antonyms: atypical, inferior, peripheral
- Example: The old stone cottage is the quintessential example of rural English architecture.

16. Quirk (noun)

- Defination: A peculiar behavioral habit; a distinctive and often odd feature or characteristic.
- Synonyms: eccentricity, idiosyncrasy, peculiarity
- Antonyms: normality, regularity, conformity
- Example: His most endearing guirk was his habit of humming softly when concentrating.

17. Quorum (noun)

- Defination: The minimum number of members of an assembly or society that must be present to make a meeting valid.
- Synonyms: majority, minimum, attendance
- Antonyms: absence, minority, insufficient
- Example: The meeting could not proceed because a quorum of members was not present.

18. Quarry (noun)

- Defination: An animal pursued or hunted; a target or object of a pursuit.
- Synonyms: prey, game, target
- Antonyms: hunter, predator, pursuer
- Example: The wolf pack relentlessly pursued its quarry through the snowy landscape.

19. Queue (noun)

- Defination: A line or sequence of people or vehicles awaiting their turn to be attended to or to proceed.
- Synonyms: line, row, file
- Antonyms: disarray, disorder, scatter
- Example: Customers formed a long queue outside the store before it opened.

20. Quest (noun)

- Defination: A long or arduous search for something.
- Synonyms: search, pursuit, expedition



- Antonyms: retreat, abandonment, surrender
- Example: His quest for knowledge led him to travel to many different countries.

21. Questionable (adjective)

- Defination: Doubtful as regards truth, authenticity, or merit; open to suspicion.
- Synonyms: dubious, suspicious, unreliable
- Antonyms: certain, reliable, credible
- Example: The ethics of their business practices are highly questionable.

22. Quarrel (verb)

- Defination: To have an angry argument or disagreement.
- Synonyms: argue, disagree, bicker
- Antonyms: agree, reconcile, harmonize
- Example: The siblings often quarrel over trivial matters, but they always reconcile quickly.

23. Qualify (verb)

- Defination: To be entitled to a particular privilege, status, or to modify or limit a statement.
- Synonyms: certify, entitle, stipulate
- Antonyms: disqualify, fail, invalidate
- Example: She hopes to qualify for the Olympic team after years of training.

24. Quarantine (verb)

- Defination: To isolate (a person, animal, or place) to prevent the spread of disease or pests.
- Synonyms: isolate, segregate, confine
- Antonyms: integrate, release, include
- Example: The health authorities decided to quarantine travelers arriving from affected regions.

25. Quiver (verb)

- Defination: To tremble or shake with a slight rapid motion.
- Synonyms: tremble, shiver, vibrate
- Antonyms: steady, still, firm
- Example: Her voice began to quiver with emotion as she recounted the story.

26. Quaff (verb)

- Defination: To drink (an alcoholic drink) heartily and quickly.
- Synonyms: guzzle, gulp, swig
- Antonyms: sip, dribble, abstain
- Example: After the long hike, he was eager to quaff a cold beer.

27. Qualm (noun)



- Defination: An uneasy feeling of doubt, worry, or fear, especially about one's own conduct.
- Synonyms: misgiving, scruple, apprehension
- Antonyms: confidence, certainty, ease
- Example: He had no qualms about reporting the illegal activity to the authorities.

28. Quay (noun)

- Defination: A concrete, stone, or metal platform running along or projecting into water for loading and unloading ships.
- Synonyms: dock, pier, wharf
- Antonyms: inland, interior, mainland
- Example: The cargo ship docked at the quay to unload its containers.

29. Quaver (verb)

- Defination: To shake or tremble in speaking, typically through nervousness or emotion.
- Synonyms: tremble, shiver, falter
- Antonyms: steady, firm, resonate
- Example: Her voice began to quaver as she delivered the difficult news.

30. Quiescent (adjective)

- Defination: In a state or period of inactivity or dormancy.
- Synonyms: dormant, inactive, latent
- Antonyms: active, dynamic, vibrant
- Example: The volcano has been quiescent for centuries, but scientists are monitoring it closely.

31. Quibbling (adjective)

- Defination: Engaging in or characterized by trivial objections or arguments.
- Synonyms: petty, trivial, hair-splitting
- Antonyms: agreeable, substantial, important
- Example: He found their constant quibbling over minor details frustrating and unproductive.

32. Quip (noun)

- Defination: A witty remark.
- Synonyms: jest, wisecrack, pun
- Antonyms: seriousness, gravity, solemnity
- Example: His quick quip diffused the tension in the room, making everyone laugh.

33. Quit (verb)

- Defination: To leave (a job, school, or place), usually permanently; to stop doing something.
- Synonyms: resign, abandon, cease
- Antonyms: start, persist, continue



- Example: She decided to quit her high-stress job and pursue her passion for art.

34. Quizzical (adjective)

- Defination: (Of a person's expression or behavior) indicating mild or amused puzzlement.
- Synonyms: perplexed, incredulous, questioning
- Antonyms: straightforward, certain, clear
- Example: He gave her a quizzical look, unsure how to interpret her sudden silence.

35. Quench (verb)

- Defination: To satisfy (thirst) by drinking; to extinguish (a fire).
- Synonyms: satisfy, extinguish, slake
- Antonyms: ignite, fuel, dry
- Example: He stopped at the stream to quench his thirst after the long run.

36. Querulous (adjective)

- Defination: Complaining in a petulant or whining manner.
- Synonyms: grumbling, whining, irritable
- Antonyms: content, cheerful, agreeable
- Example: The querulous old man was constantly complaining about the cold weather.

37. Questionnaire (noun)

- Defination: A set of printed or written questions with a choice of answers, devised for the purposes of a survey or statistical study.
- Synonyms: survey, poll, form
- Antonyms: interview, discussion, analysis
- Example: The researchers distributed a questionnaire to gather data on consumer preferences.

38. Quick (adjective)

- Defination: Moving or doing something with great speed; prompt and immediate.
- Synonyms: fast, rapid, swift
- Antonyms: slow, sluggish, leisurely
- Example: He made a guick decision to avoid the approaching car.

39. Quiet (adjective)

- Defination: Making little or no noise; peaceful and undisturbed.
- Synonyms: silent, peaceful, calm
- Antonyms: loud, noisy, boisterous
- Example: The library is usually a very quiet place for studying.

40. Quietus (noun)

- Defination: A final release from life or activity; a finishing stroke.



- Synonyms: cessation, end, demise
- Antonyms: revival, commencement, resurrection
- Example: The company's bankruptcy put a quietus on their expansion plans.

41. Quintessence (noun)

- Defination: The most perfect or typical example of a quality or class.
- Synonyms: epitome, essence, archetype
- Antonyms: imperfection, deviation, anomaly
- Example: She was considered the quintessence of elegance and sophistication.

42. Quirky (adjective)

- Defination: Characterized by peculiar or unexpected traits or aspects.
- Synonyms: eccentric, unconventional, peculiar
- Antonyms: conventional, ordinary, common
- Example: The play featured quirky characters and an unusual plot.

43. Quitclaim (noun)

- Defination: A formal renunciation of a claim or right, especially to property.
- Synonyms: renunciation, relinquishment, waiver
- Antonyms: claim, assertion, acquisition
- Example: He signed a guitclaim deed to transfer his interest in the property.

44. Quotation (noun)

- Defination: A group of words taken from a text or speech and repeated by someone other than the original author or speaker.
- Synonyms: excerpt, passage, citation
- Antonyms: original, invention, creation
- Example: The student began her essay with a famous quotation from Shakespeare.

45. Quote (verb)

- Defination: To repeat or copy out (words from a text or speech) by someone other than the original author or speaker.
- Synonyms: cite, recite, extract
- Antonyms: originalize, invent, compose
- Example: He often likes to quote his favorite authors during his lectures.

46. Quotient (noun)

- Defination: A result obtained by dividing one quantity by another.
- Synonyms: result, ratio, proportion
- Antonyms: product, dividend, divisor
- Example: In the equation, 6 divided by 2 has a quotient of 3.



47. Quarter (noun)

- Defination: One of four equal parts into which something is divided.
- Synonyms: fourth, section, portion
- Antonyms: whole, entirety, totality
- Example: She ate a quarter of the apple and saved the rest.

48. Quadrant (noun)

- Defination: Each of four parts of a circle, divided by two lines perpendicular at the center.
- Synonyms: sector, segment, section
- Antonyms: circle, entirety, whole
- Example: The city map was divided into four quadrants for easier navigation.

49. Quadruple (verb)

- Defination: To increase or be increased fourfold.
- Synonyms: multiply, fourfold, magnify
- Antonyms: halve, quarter, reduce
- Example: The company plans to quadruple its production capacity over the next year.

50. Quadrennial (adjective)

- Defination: Recurring every four years.
- Synonyms: four-yearly, four-year, cyclic
- Antonyms: annual, biennial, perennial
- Example: The Olympic Games are a quadrennial international multi-sport event.

51. Quasi (adverb)

- Defination: Seemingly; apparently but not really; having a likeness to something.
- Synonyms: pseudo, partly, seemingly
- Antonyms: truly, genuinely, fully
- Example: He had a quasi-scientific approach to problem-solving, lacking rigorous methodology.

52. Quasar (noun)

- Defination: A massive and extremely remote celestial object, emitting exceptionally large amounts of energy, and typically having a starlike image in a telescope.
- Synonyms: celestial body, luminous object, galactic core
- Antonyms: void, emptiness, darkness
- Example: The study of quasars helps scientists understand the early universe.

53. Quatrain (noun)

- Defination: A stanza of four lines, especially one having alternate rhymes.
- Synonyms: stanza, verse, tetrastich



- Antonyms: epic, prose, novel
- Example: Many classical poems are composed of rhyming quatrains.

54. Queasy (adjective)

- Defination: (Of a person) feeling sick; nauseated.
- Synonyms: nauseous, sick, uneasy
- Antonyms: steady, well, robust
- Example: The choppy boat ride made her feel queasy and uncomfortable.

55. Queen (noun)

- Defination: The female ruler of an independent state, especially one who inherits the position by right of birth.
- Synonyms: monarch, sovereign, empress
- Antonyms: king, peasant, subject
- Example: The queen addressed the nation on her birthday.

56. Quick-witted (adjective)

- Defination: Able to think and understand quickly, especially in a humorous or clever way.
- Synonyms: clever, sharp, ingenious
- Antonyms: slow-witted, dull, unintelligent
- Example: Her quick-witted responses made her a formidable debater.

57. Quick-tempered (adjective)

- Defination: Easily made angry.
- Synonyms: irascible, hot-headed, choleric
- Antonyms: even-tempered, patient, calm
- Example: His quick-tempered nature often led to arguments with his colleagues.

58. Quickly (adverb)

- Defination: At a fast speed; rapidly or promptly.
- Synonyms: rapidly, swiftly, promptly
- Antonyms: slowly, gradually, leisurely
- Example: She finished her work quickly and left the office.

59. Quaintness (noun)

- Defination: The quality of being attractively unusual or old-fashioned.
- Synonyms: charm, picturesqueness, old-worldliness
- Antonyms: modernity, trendiness, commonplaceness
- Example: The quaintness of the old bookstore was part of its charm.

60. Qualification (noun)



- Defination: A pass of an examination or an official completion of a course of training, especially one that enables a person to practice a particular profession.
- Synonyms: credential, certification, accomplishment
- Antonyms: disqualification, inadequacy, inability
- Example: Having a strong academic qualification is crucial for this role.

61. Quantify (verb)

- Defination: To express or measure the quantity of something.
- Synonyms: measure, calculate, gauge
- Antonyms: qualify, describe, estimate
- Example: It's challenging to quantify the emotional impact of the artwork.

62. Quantum (noun)

- Defination: A discrete quantity of energy proportional in magnitude to the frequency of the radiation it represents.
- Synonyms: increment, unit, portion
- Antonyms: macro, classical, infinite
- Example: The new discovery marked a quantum leap in scientific understanding.

63. Quirkiness (noun)

- Defination: The quality of having peculiar or unexpected traits; individuality.
- Synonyms: eccentricity, individuality, unconventionality
- Antonyms: conformity, conventionality, normality
- Example: The film's appeal lay in the quirkiness of its characters and plot.

64. Quittance (noun)

- Defination: A release or discharge from a debt or obligation.
- Synonyms: discharge, release, acquittal
- Antonyms: debt, obligation, liability
- Example: Upon final payment, he received a quittance for the loan.

65. Quitter (noun)

- Defination: A person who gives up easily or defaults on a task.
- Synonyms: deserter, loser, defeatist
- Antonyms: persister, achiever, fighter
- Example: Despite the challenges, he was no quitter and persevered until the end.

66. Quondam (adjective)

- Defination: That once was; former.
- Synonyms: former, erstwhile, previous
- Antonyms: current, present, future



- Example: The quondam rivals are now close collaborators on a new project.

67. Quotable (adjective)

- Defination: Suitable or interesting enough to be guoted.
- Synonyms: memorable, citation-worthy, notable
- Antonyms: unremarkable, unmemorable, unoriginal
- Example: The politician's speech was full of memorable and quotable lines.

68. Quarterly (adjective)

- Defination: Produced or occurring once every three months.
- Synonyms: three-monthly, seasonal, periodic
- Antonyms: annually, monthly, weekly
- Example: The company publishes a quarterly report on its financial performance.

69. Quake (verb)

- Defination: To shake or tremble, especially from an earthquake or fear.
- Synonyms: tremble, shiver, vibrate
- Antonyms: stabilize, firm, settle
- Example: The entire building began to quake during the tremor.

70. Quad (noun)

- Defination: A rectangular courtyard or similar open space surrounded by buildings, especially in a school or college.
- Synonyms: courtyard, plaza, square
- Antonyms: interior, building, enclosure
- Example: Students often gather in the main quad during lunch breaks.

71. Quaffable (adjective)

- Defination: (Of a drink) pleasant and easy to drink heartily.
- Synonyms: drinkable, palatable, refreshing
- Antonyms: undrinkable, unpalatable, distasteful
- Example: The light ale was particularly quaffable on a hot summer's day.

72. Quaking (adjective)

- Defination: Shaking or trembling, typically with fear or cold.
- Synonyms: trembling, shivering, vibrating
- Antonyms: steady, firm, motionless
- Example: He stood there, a quaking figure, having witnessed the accident.

73. Qualifying (adjective)

- Defination: Meeting the necessary conditions or requirements for something.



- Synonyms: eligible, requisite, entitling
- Antonyms: disqualifying, failing, ineligible
- Example: She passed the qualifying exam and is now eligible for the program.

74. Quantification (noun)

- Defination: The action of measuring or expressing the quantity of something.
- Synonyms: measurement, calculation, assessment
- Antonyms: description, estimation, qualification
- Example: The precise quantification of the chemical components was essential for the experiment.

75. Quarrying (noun)

- Defination: The process of extracting stone or other materials from a quarry.
- Synonyms: excavation, mining, extraction
- Antonyms: filling, restoration, rehabilitation
- Example: Quarrying operations can have a significant environmental impact on the local landscape.

76. Quarrelsome (adjective)

- Defination: Given to arguing or fighting.
- Synonyms: argumentative, belligerent, contentious
- Antonyms: agreeable, peaceful, harmonious
- Example: His quarrelsome nature made it difficult for him to maintain long-term friendships.

77. Quick-dry (adjective)

- Defination: Designed to dry quickly.
- Synonyms: fast-drying, rapid-drying, absorbent
- Antonyms: slow-drying, water-retentive, saturating
- Example: She packed quick-dry clothing for her hiking trip to ensure comfort.

78. Quartet (noun)

- Defination: A group of four people playing music or singing together, or a piece of music for four performers.
- Synonyms: foursome, group, ensemble
- Antonyms: solo, duet, trio
- Example: The string quartet performed a beautiful classical piece at the concert.

79. Quick-fix (noun)

- Defination: A temporary or improvised solution to a problem, often one that is inadequate or superficial.
- Synonyms: stopgap, makeshift, temporary solution
- Antonyms: long-term solution, permanent remedy, thorough repair
- Example: The government's proposal was criticized as a quick-fix that wouldn't address the root



causes of poverty.

80. Quiescence (noun)

- Defination: The state of being quiet, still, or inactive.
- Synonyms: inactivity, dormancy, stillness
- Antonyms: activity, motion, commotion
- Example: The long period of quiescence in the market ended with a sudden surge in stock prices.

81. Quiddity (noun)

- Defination: The inherent nature or essence of someone or something.
- Synonyms: essence, nature, gist
- Antonyms: superficiality, irrelevance, externality
- Example: Philosophers often ponder the quiddity of existence.

82. Quidnunc (noun)

- Defination: An inquisitive or gossipy person.
- Synonyms: gossip, busybody, snoop
- Antonyms: reticent, discreet, reserved person
- Example: The old woman in the village was a well-known quidnunc, always eager for the latest news.

83. Quipster (noun)

- Defination: A person who makes witty remarks.
- Synonyms: wit, jester, wag
- Antonyms: serious person, bore, conventionalist
- Example: The comedian was a natural quipster, always ready with a clever retort.

84. Quick-release (adjective)

- Defination: Designed to be quickly unfastened or detached.
- Synonyms: detachable, fast-release, unfastenable
- Antonyms: fixed, secured, permanent
- Example: The camera strap had a quick-release buckle for easy removal.

85. Quick-set (adjective)

- Defination: Hardening or solidifying quickly.
- Synonyms: fast-curing, rapid-setting, instant
- Antonyms: slow-setting, delayed, prolonged
- Example: They used a quick-set cement to rapidly repair the broken step.

86. Quick-start (noun)

- Defination: A rapid and efficient beginning, often referring to a guide or mechanism.



- Synonyms: fast beginning, rapid initiation, expedited launch
- Antonyms: slow start, delayed beginning, complex setup
- Example: The new software came with a quick-start guide for easy installation.

87. Quinary (adjective)

- Defination: Relating to or based on the number five.
- Synonyms: pental, fivefold, quintic
- Antonyms: binary, decimal, solitary
- Example: Some ancient numbering systems were based on a quinary structure.

88. Quintuple (verb)

- Defination: To make or become five times as large or as many.
- Synonyms: multiply by five, increase fivefold, magnify
- Antonyms: single, halve, reduce
- Example: The company aims to quintuple its profits within the next decade.

89. Quintuplet (noun)

- Defination: One of five children born at one birth.
- Synonyms: fivesome, five-of-a-kind, multiples
- Antonyms: single, twin, triplet
- Example: The birth of quintuplets made national headlines.

90. Quick-thinking (adjective)

- Defination: Having a quick mind; able to think and react quickly, especially in unexpected situations.
- Synonyms: sharp-witted, alert, resourceful
- Antonyms: slow-thinking, muddled, dull-witted
- Example: Her quick-thinking saved them from a dangerous situation.

91. Quick-acting (adjective)

- Defination: Producing a rapid effect.
- Synonyms: fast-acting, rapid-effect, instantaneous
- Antonyms: slow-acting, delayed, inert
- Example: The guick-acting medicine provided immediate relief from the pain.

92. Quick-fire (adjective)

- Defination: (Especially of questions or responses) rapid and delivered in quick succession.
- Synonyms: rapid-fire, rapid, fast-paced
- Antonyms: slow, deliberate, ponderous
- Example: The journalist posed a series of quick-fire questions to the politician.



93. Quick-service (adjective)

- Defination: Relating to establishments where food is prepared and served quickly, often with limited table service.
- Synonyms: fast-food, rapid-service, convenient
- Antonyms: full-service, slow-service, leisurely
- Example: Many fast-food restaurants are known for their quick-service model.

94. Quickness (noun)

- Defination: The state or quality of moving or reacting with speed; promptness.
- Synonyms: speed, rapidity, swiftness
- Antonyms: slowness, sluggishness, deliberation
- Example: His quickness of thought allowed him to solve the complex problem efficiently.

95. Quibbler (noun)

- Defination: A person who argues about or raises trivial objections.
- Synonyms: nitpicker, caviller, critic
- Antonyms: peacemaker, conformist, acceptor
- Example: He was known as a quibbler, always finding minor faults in every proposal.

96. Quizzically (adverb)

- Defination: In a way that shows mild or amused puzzlement.
- Synonyms: perplexedly, incredulously, questioningly
- Antonyms: directly, plainly, confidently
- Example: She looked at him quizzically, wondering what he meant by that statement.

97. Quakingly (adverb)

- Defination: In a trembling or shaking manner, typically from fear or emotion.
- Synonyms: tremblingly, shiveringly, nervously
- Antonyms: steadily, firmly, calmly
- Example: He spoke quakingly, barely able to control his fear.

98. Quietly (adverb)

- Defination: Making little or no noise; with little sound.
- Synonyms: silently, softly, discreetly
- Antonyms: loudly, noisily, boisterously
- Example: She quietly slipped out of the room to avoid disturbing anyone.

99. Quietness (noun)

- Defination: The state of being quiet; silence or tranquility.
- Synonyms: silence, stillness, peacefulness



- Antonyms: noise, clamor, commotion
