1. Ubiquitous (adjective)

- Defination: Present, appearing, or found everywhere.
- Synonyms: omnipresent, pervasive, everywhere
- Antonyms: rare, scarce, limited
- Example: In the digital age, smartphones have become ubiquitous.

2. Unanimous (adjective)

- Defination: Fully in agreement by everyone involved.
- Synonyms: agreed, united, harmonious
- Antonyms: divided, disagreeing, opposed
- Example: The committee reached a unanimous decision to approve the new policy.

3. Undermine (verb)

- Defination: To weaken (someone or something) gradually or insidiously.
- Synonyms: sabotage, weaken, erode
- Antonyms: strengthen, support, reinforce
- Example: Constant criticism can undermine a student's confidence.

4. Unilateral (adjective)

- Defination: Performed or undertaken by only one party, group, or country without the agreement of another or others.

- Example: The government made a unilateral decision to withdraw from the treaty.

5. Unprecedented (adjective)

- Defination: Never done or known before; unparalleled.
- Synonyms: unparalleled, unmatched, novel
- Antonyms: common, ordinary, familiar
- Example: The recent global health crisis presented an unprecedented challenge.

6. Unravel (verb)

- Defination: To undo twisted, knitted, or woven threads; to investigate and solve or explain (something complicated or puzzling).
- Synonyms: untangle, solve, decipher
- Antonyms: entangle, complicate, confuse
- Example: Detectives worked hard to unravel the mystery surrounding the ancient artifact.

7. Unscrupulous (adjective)

- Defination: Having or showing no moral principles; not honest or fair.

- Example: An unscrupulous businessman might exploit workers for personal gain.

8. Uplift (verb)

- Defination: To raise to a higher spiritual or intellectual level; to make someone feel more hopeful, happy, or positive.

- Example: Her inspiring speech did much to uplift the spirits of the audience.

9. Urgent (adjective)

10. Usurp (verb)
