1. Valid (adjective)

- Defination: Based on truth or reason; able to be accepted.
- Synonyms: legitimate, sound, plausible
- Antonyms: invalid, baseless, false
- Example: The research findings must be supported by valid data.

2. Vary (verb)

- Defination: To be different or change according to circumstances.
- Synonyms: differ, fluctuate, diverge
- Antonyms: remain, stabilize, conform
- Example: The costs will vary depending on the materials used.

3. Vast (adjective)

- Defination: Of very great extent or quantity; immense.
- Synonyms: immense, enormous, huge
- Antonyms: tiny, limited, narrow
- Example: The company operates a vast network of suppliers.

4. Venture (noun)

- Defination: A risky or daring journey or undertaking; a business enterprise involving considerable risk.
- Synonyms: enterprise, endeavor, undertaking
- Antonyms: stagnation, safety, retreat
- Example: His latest business venture proved to be very successful.

5. Verify (verb)

- Defination: To make sure or demonstrate that something is true, accurate, or justified.
- Synonyms: confirm, authenticate, substantiate
- Antonyms: disprove, refute, invalidate
- Example: Please verify your personal details before submitting the form.

6. Vigorous (adjective)

- Defination: Strong, healthy, and full of energy; characterized by forceful or intense action.
- Synonyms: energetic, robust, forceful
- Antonyms: weak, lethargic, feeble
- Example: She maintains a vigorous exercise routine to stay fit.

7. Vulnerable (adjective)

- Defination: Exposed to the possibility of being attacked or harmed, either physically or emotionally.
- Synonyms: susceptible, defenseless, exposed
- Antonyms: invulnerable, protected, resilient



- Example: Elderly people are often more vulnerable to severe illnesses.

8. Vacant (adjective)

- Defination: Having no contents; empty; not filled or occupied.
- Synonyms: empty, unoccupied, unused
- Antonyms: occupied, filled, taken
- Example: The office building has several vacant units available for rent.

9. Vague (adjective)

- Defination: Of uncertain, indefinite, or unclear character or meaning.
- Synonyms: unclear, indefinite, ambiguous
- Antonyms: clear, precise, explicit
- Example: The instructions were so vague that I didn't know how to proceed.

10. Valuable (adjective)

- Defination: Worth a great deal of money; very useful or important.
- Synonyms: precious, priceless, beneficial
- Antonyms: worthless, useless, cheap
- Example: The experience gained from volunteering is incredibly valuable.

11. Vanishing (adjective)

- Defination: Disappearing from existence; gradually ceasing to exist.
- Synonyms: disappearing, dwindling, fading
- Antonyms: appearing, growing, emerging
- Example: Many species in the rainforest are facing a vanishing habitat.

12. Variety (noun)

- Defination: The quality or state of being different or diverse; the absence of monotony.
- Synonyms: diversity, assortment, range
- Antonyms: uniformity, sameness, monotony
- Example: The supermarket offers a wide variety of fresh produce.

13. Vehement (adjective)

- Defination: Showing strong feeling; forceful, passionate, or intense.
- Synonyms: passionate, fervent, intense
- Antonyms: apathetic, indifferent, mild
- Example: The proposal was met with vehement opposition from the public.

14. Verbal (adjective)

- Defination: Relating to or in the form of words; spoken rather than written.



- Synonyms: oral, spoken, articulated
- Antonyms: written, nonverbal, unspoken
- Example: He gave a verbal agreement, but no written contract was signed.

15. Verdict (noun)

- Defination: A decision on a disputed issue in a civil or criminal case or an inquest; an opinion or judgment.
- Synonyms: judgment, ruling, decision
- Antonyms: indictment, accusation, charge
- Example: The jury returned a guilty verdict after days of deliberation.

16. Verge (noun)

- Defination: An edge or border; the point at which something is about to happen.
- Synonyms: brink, edge, threshold
- Antonyms: middle, center, interior
- Example: The company was on the verge of bankruptcy before a last-minute rescue.

17. Versatile (adjective)

- Defination: Able to adapt or be adapted to many different functions or activities.
- Synonyms: adaptable, flexible, multifaceted
- Antonyms: inflexible, limited, specialized
- Example: The new software is highly versatile and can be used for various tasks.

18. Vertical (adjective)

- Defination: At right angles to a horizontal plane; upright.
- Synonyms: upright, perpendicular, erect
- Antonyms: horizontal, flat, prone
- Example: The building has a striking vertical design, emphasizing its height.

19. Vex (verb)

- Defination: To make someone feel annoyed, frustrated, or worried, especially with trivial matters.
- Synonyms: annoy, irritate, frustrate
- Antonyms: please, delight, soothe
- Example: Constant delays tend to vex even the most patient travelers.

20. Viable (adjective)

- Defination: Capable of working successfully; feasible.
- Synonyms: feasible, workable, achievable
- Antonyms: unviable, impossible, impractical
- Example: The company needs a viable business plan to secure investment.



21. Vibrant (adjective)

- Defination: Full of energy and enthusiasm; bright and striking.
- Synonyms: lively, energetic, colorful
- Antonyms: dull, lifeless, pale
- Example: The city has a vibrant nightlife with many restaurants and bars.

22. Victorious (adjective)

- Defination: Having won a victory; triumphant.
- Synonyms: triumphant, conquering, successful
- Antonyms: defeated, losing, unsuccessful
- Example: The team returned home victorious after a hard-fought match.

23. Viewpoint (noun)

- Defination: A person's opinion or point of view.
- Synonyms: perspective, opinion, standpoint
- Antonyms: disagreement, dissent, opposition
- Example: From an environmental viewpoint, the project is highly controversial.

24. Vigilant (adjective)

- Defination: Keeping careful watch for possible danger or difficulties.
- Synonyms: watchful, alert, attentive
- Antonyms: careless, negligent, unobservant
- Example: Security guards remained vigilant throughout the night.

25. Vilify (verb)

- Defination: To speak or write about in an abusively disparaging manner.
- Synonyms: malign, slander, denigrate
- Antonyms: praise, exalt, commend
- Example: The politician tried to vilify his opponent during the debate.

26. Vindicate (verb)

- Defination: To clear someone of blame or suspicion; to show or prove to be right, reasonable, or justified.
- Synonyms: exonerate, absolve, justify
- Antonyms: accuse, condemn, blame
- Example: New evidence emerged to vindicate the accused man.

27. Virtual (adjective)

- Defination: Almost or nearly as described, but not completely or according to strict definition; existing only in a computer.
- Synonyms: simulated, digital, effective



- Antonyms: real, actual, physical
- Example: The company held a virtual meeting with participants from around the globe.

28. Virtue (noun)

- Defination: Behavior showing high moral standards; a quality considered morally good or desirable.
- Synonyms: morality, integrity, goodness
- Antonyms: vice, wickedness, immorality
- Example: Patience is a virtue that is often rewarded.

29. Visible (adjective)

- Defination: Able to be seen.
- Synonyms: perceptible, discernible, apparent
- Antonyms: invisible, hidden, unseen
- Example: The moon was clearly visible in the night sky.

30. Visionary (adjective)

- Defination: Thinking about or planning the future with imagination or wisdom.
- Synonyms: innovative, imaginative, prophetic
- Antonyms: unimaginative, conventional, myopic
- Example: Steve Jobs was a visionary leader who revolutionized technology.

31. Vital (adjective)

- Defination: Absolutely necessary or important; essential.
- Synonyms: essential, crucial, indispensable
- Antonyms: unimportant, nonessential, trivial
- Example: It is vital to stay hydrated, especially in hot weather.

32. Vivacious (adjective)

- Defination: Attractively lively and animated.
- Synonyms: lively, animated, effervescent
- Antonyms: dull, lifeless, subdued
- Example: Her vivacious personality made her popular at social gatherings.

33. Vocational (adjective)

- Defination: Relating to an occupation or employment; especially training for a particular trade or profession.
- Synonyms: occupational, professional, career-oriented
- Antonyms: academic, theoretical, general
- Example: Many students choose vocational courses to gain practical skills.



34. Vogue (noun)

- Defination: The prevailing fashion or style at a particular time.
- Synonyms: fashion, trend, fad
- Antonyms: outmoded, antiquated, unfashionable
- Example: Long coats are currently in vogue for winter fashion.

35. Volatile (adjective)

- Defination: Liable to change rapidly and unpredictably, especially for the worse; easily evaporated.
- Synonyms: unstable, unpredictable, erratic
- Antonyms: stable, predictable, constant
- Example: The stock market can be highly volatile, with prices fluctuating daily.

36. Voluminous (adjective)

- Defination: Occupying or containing much space; ample in quantity or size.
- Synonyms: ample, copious, extensive
- Antonyms: meager, scanty, sparse
- Example: The author left behind a voluminous collection of unpublished manuscripts.

37. Voluntary (adjective)

- Defination: Done, given, or acting of one's own free will.
- Synonyms: optional, discretionary, unforced
- Antonyms: mandatory, compulsory, required
- Example: He made a voluntary donation to the charity.

38. Voracious (adjective)

- Defination: Having a very eager approach to an activity, or a huge appetite for food.
- Synonyms: insatiable, greedy, avid
- Antonyms: apathetic, indifferent, satiated
- Example: He is a voracious reader, often finishing several books a week.

39. Vouch (verb)

- Defination: To assert or confirm as a result of one's own experience that something is true or accurate; to guarantee.
- Synonyms: attest, certify, guarantee
- Antonyms: deny, refute, discredit
- Example: I can vouch for her honesty and integrity.

40. Vow (noun)

- Defination: A solemn promise.
- Synonyms: promise, oath, pledge



- Antonyms: breach, betrayal, infringement
- Example: They exchanged marriage vows in front of their families.

41. Voyage (noun)

- Defination: A long journey by sea or in space.
- Synonyms: journey, expedition, trip
- Antonyms: stay, docking, anchorage
- Example: The Titanic's maiden voyage ended tragically.

42. Vulgar (adjective)

- Defination: Lacking sophistication or good taste; unrefined.
- Synonyms: crude, tasteless, coarse
- Antonyms: refined, polite, elegant
- Example: His vulgar comments offended many people in the audience.

43. Vacillate (verb)

- Defination: To waver between different opinions or actions; be indecisive.
- Synonyms: waver, hesitate, oscillate
- Antonyms: decide, resolve, commit
- Example: He tends to vacillate between two career paths.

44. Vacuous (adjective)

- Defination: Having or showing a lack of thought or intelligence; mindless.
- Synonyms: empty-headed, mindless, blank
- Antonyms: intelligent, thoughtful, perceptive
- Example: He offered a vacuous smile, indicating his lack of understanding.

45. Vagrant (noun)

- Defination: A person without a settled home or regular work who wanders from place to place and lives by begging.
- Synonyms: homeless, drifter, tramp
- Antonyms: resident, settler, dweller
- Example: The city established shelters for vagrants during the cold winter months.

46. Valiant (adjective)

- Defination: Possessing or showing courage or determination.
- Synonyms: brave, courageous, heroic
- Antonyms: cowardly, timid, fearful
- Example: The valiant firefighters rescued everyone from the burning building.

47. Valor (noun)



- Defination: Great courage in the face of danger, especially in battle.
- Synonyms: bravery, courage, heroism
- Antonyms: cowardice, timidity, fear
- Example: His valor in combat earned him a medal of honor.

48. Vanguard (noun)

- Defination: A group of people leading the way in new developments or ideas; the foremost part of an advancing army or naval force.
- Synonyms: forefront, pioneers, avant-garde
- Antonyms: rear, followers, stragglers
- Example: The company sees itself as the vanguard of technological innovation.

49. Vanquish (verb)

- Defination: To defeat thoroughly.
- Synonyms: conquer, defeat, overcome
- Antonyms: surrender, lose, succumb
- Example: The army aimed to vanquish their enemies and restore peace.

50. Vapid (adjective)

- Defination: Offering nothing stimulating or challenging; dull.
- Synonyms: dull, uninspired, bland
- Antonyms: lively, stimulating, original
- Example: The play's vapid dialogue made it difficult to stay engaged.

51. Variegated (adjective)

- Defination: Exhibiting different colors, especially as irregular patches or streaks.
- Synonyms: multicolored, patterned, diverse
- Antonyms: uniform, monochromatic, plain
- Example: The garden displayed a variegated collection of flowers.

52. Venerable (adjective)

- Defination: Accorded a great deal of respect, especially because of age, wisdom, or character.
- Synonyms: respected, honored, revered
- Antonyms: disrespected, contemptible, unworthy
- Example: The venerable professor was a respected figure in the academic community.

53. Venom (noun)

- Defination: A poisonous substance secreted by animals; extreme malice and bitterness.
- Synonyms: poison, toxin, malice
- Antonyms: antidote, benevolence, kindness



- Example: The snake's venom is potent and can be fatal.

54. Ventilate (verb)

- Defination: To cause air to circulate freely through a room or building.
- Synonyms: aerate, circulate, air out
- Antonyms: stifle, suffocate, seal
- Example: It's important to ventilate the kitchen after cooking to remove odors.

55. Verbatim (adverb)

- Defination: In exactly the same words as were originally used.
- Synonyms: word for word, exactly, literally
- Antonyms: paraphrased, summarized, loosely
- Example: The secretary recorded the speech verbatim, word for word.

56. Verdant (adjective)

- Defination: Green with grass or other rich vegetation.
- Synonyms: green, lush, leafy
- Antonyms: barren, arid, desolate
- Example: The verdant hills stretched as far as the eye could see.

57. Verifiable (adjective)

- Defination: Able to be checked or demonstrated to be true, accurate, or justified.
- Synonyms: provable, testable, confirmable
- Antonyms: unverifiable, unprovable, dubious
- Example: The claims presented require verifiable evidence.

58. Verity (noun)

- Defination: A true principle or belief, especially one of fundamental importance; truth.
- Synonyms: truth, reality, actuality
- Antonyms: falsehood, lie, deception
- Example: The scientist was dedicated to uncovering the fundamental verities of nature.

59. Vernacular (noun)

- Defination: The language or dialect spoken by the ordinary people in a particular country or region.
- Synonyms: dialect, jargon, colloquialism
- Antonyms: standard language, formal language, literary language
- Example: The poem was written in the local vernacular, making it accessible to common folk.

60. Versed (adjective)

- Defination: Experienced or skilled in; knowledgeable about.



- Synonyms: knowledgeable, proficient, skilled
- Antonyms: unversed, ignorant, inexperienced
- Example: He is well-versed in classical literature.

61. Vestige (noun)

- Defination: A trace or remnant of something that is disappearing or no longer exists.
- Synonyms: remnant, trace, relic
- Antonyms: presence, existence, whole
- Example: The ancient ruins were the last vestige of a forgotten civilization.

62. Veteran (noun)

- Defination: A person who has had long experience in a particular field, especially in the military.
- Synonyms: expert, old hand, seasoned professional
- Antonyms: novice, rookie, beginner
- Example: The company's marketing team included several industry veterans.

63. Veto (noun)

- Defination: A constitutional right to reject a decision or proposal made by a law-making body.
- Synonyms: rejection, prohibition, ban
- Antonyms: approval, assent, endorsement
- Example: The president exercised his power of veto on the new bill.

64. Vexatious (adjective)

- Defination: Causing or tending to cause annoyance, frustration, or worry.
- Synonyms: annoying, irritating, troublesome
- Antonyms: pleasant, soothing, calming
- Example: He faced many vexatious delays in completing his project.

65. Vicarious (adjective)

- Defination: Experienced in the imagination through the feelings or actions of another person.
- Synonyms: indirect, sympathetic, empathetic
- Antonyms: direct, personal, firsthand
- Example: She felt a vicarious thrill watching her favorite athlete win the championship.

66. Vicissitude (noun)

- Defination: A change of circumstances or fortune, typically one that is unwelcome or unpleasant.
- Synonyms: change, alteration, fluctuation
- Antonyms: stability, consistency, steadfastness
- Example: The business faced many vicissitudes, from economic downturns to technological shifts.



67. Vie (verb)

- Defination: To compete eagerly with someone in order to achieve something.
- Synonyms: compete, contend, struggle
- Antonyms: collaborate, cooperate, yield
- Example: Several companies are vying for the lucrative government contract.

68. Vigilance (noun)

- Defination: The action or state of keeping careful watch for possible danger or difficulties.
- Synonyms: alertness, watchfulness, caution
- Antonyms: negligence, carelessness, inattention
- Example: Customer vigilance is crucial in preventing online fraud.

69. Vile (adjective)

- Defination: Extremely unpleasant; morally bad; wicked.
- Synonyms: wicked, evil, disgusting
- Antonyms: pleasant, honorable, admirable
- Example: He was arrested for committing a vile act.

70. Vintage (adjective)

- Defination: Of recognized quality and enduring appeal; denoting something from the past of high quality.
- Synonyms: classic, retro, old-fashioned
- Antonyms: modern, new, contemporary
- Example: She collects vintage clothing from the 1960s.

71. Virile (adjective)

- Defination: Having or characterized by strength, energy, and a strong sex drive.
- Synonyms: manly, robust, potent
- Antonyms: effeminate, weak, impotent
- Example: He portrayed a virile and commanding figure in the film.

72. Virtuosity (noun)

- Defination: Great skill in music or another artistic pursuit.
- Synonyms: mastery, expertise, dexterity
- Antonyms: incompetence, clumsiness, amateurism
- Example: His piano performance was characterized by astonishing virtuosity.

73. Visage (noun)

- Defination: A person's face, with reference to the form or proportions of the features.
- Synonyms: face, countenance, appearance



- Antonyms: back, rear, hidden features
- Example: Her calm visage gave no hint of the turmoil she felt inside.

74. Visceral (adjective)

- Defination: Relating to deep inward feelings rather than to the intellect.
- Synonyms: instinctive, gut-feeling, intuitive
- Antonyms: intellectual, logical, rational
- Example: She had a visceral reaction of fear when she saw the spider.

75. Vista (noun)

- Defination: A pleasing view, especially one seen through a long, narrow opening.
- Synonyms: view, panorama, outlook
- Antonyms: enclosure, confinement, blind spot
- Example: The balcony offered a breathtaking vista of the ocean.

76. Vitality (noun)

- Defination: The state of being strong and active; energy.
- Synonyms: energy, liveliness, vigor
- Antonyms: lethargy, weakness, apathy
- Example: Regular exercise is essential for maintaining vitality in old age.

77. Vitiate (verb)

- Defination: To spoil or impair the quality or efficiency of; to destroy or impair the legal validity of.
- Synonyms: impair, spoil, corrupt
- Antonyms: purify, enhance, strengthen
- Example: The negative publicity could vitiate the company's reputation.

78. Vitriolic (adjective)

- Defination: Full of bitter verbal abuse or malice.
- Synonyms: caustic, sarcastic, biting
- Antonyms: mild, pleasant, flattering
- Example: The politician launched a vitriolic attack against his critics.

79. Vivify (verb)

- Defination: To make more lively, vivid, or striking; to animate.
- Synonyms: animate, enliven, invigorate
- Antonyms: dull, dead, demoralize
- Example: The artist used bright colors to vivify the landscape painting.

80. Vocation (noun)



- Defination: A strong feeling of suitability for a particular career or occupation.
- Synonyms: calling, profession, occupation
- Antonyms: avocation, hobby, leisure
- Example: He felt a strong vocation to become a teacher.

81. Void (noun)

- Defination: A completely empty space; a feeling of emptiness or loss.
- Synonyms: empty space, gap, emptiness
- Antonyms: fullness, abundance, presence
- Example: After his departure, his absence left a void in her life.

82. Volition (noun)

- Defination: The faculty or power of using one's will.
- Synonyms: will, choice, accord
- Antonyms: coercion, compulsion, duress
- Example: She left the company of her own volition, not because she was forced.

83. Volley (noun)

- Defination: A number of bullets, arrows, or other projectiles discharged at one time; a rapid discharge of words or questions.
- Synonyms: barrage, fusillade, salvo
- Antonyms: single shot, silence, pause
- Example: The prime minister faced a volley of questions from reporters.

84. Vortex (noun)

- Defination: A mass of whirling fluid or air; a situation into which one is inexorably drawn.
- Synonyms: whirlpool, eddy, maelstrom
- Antonyms: stillness, calm, stability
- Example: The small boat was sucked into a powerful vortex.

85. Voucher (noun)

- Defination: A small printed piece of paper that entitles the holder to a discount, or that may be exchanged for goods or services.
- Synonyms: coupon, token, certificate
- Antonyms: invoice, bill, payment
- Example: She used a voucher to get a discount on her groceries.

86. Voyeur (noun)

- Defination: A person who gains sexual pleasure from watching others when they are naked or engaged in sexual activity.
- Synonyms: peeping tom, onlooker, spectator



- Antonyms: participant, actor, subject
- Example: The film explored themes of privacy and the act of being a voyeur.

87. Valediction (noun)

- Defination: An act of bidding farewell; a statement or address made at a farewell.
- Synonyms: farewell, goodbye, departure
- Antonyms: greeting, welcome, salutation
- Example: The professor's valediction to his students was both touching and inspiring.

88. Vapidity (noun)

- Defination: The state of being vapid (offering nothing stimulating or challenging; dull).
- Synonyms: dullness, blandness, tediousness
- Antonyms: liveliness, vibrancy, stimulation
- Example: The vapidity of the conversation made her want to leave.

89. Vegetate (verb)

- Defination: To live or spend a period of time in a dull, inactive, unchallenging way.
- Synonyms: languish, stagnate, idle
- Antonyms: thrive, flourish, engage
- Example: After retirement, he just wanted to vegetate on the couch all day.

90. Veil (noun)

- Defination: A piece of fine material worn by women to protect or conceal the face; something that conceals, covers, or obscures.
- Synonyms: cover, screen, shroud
- Antonyms: reveal, expose, uncover
- Example: A veil of mist covered the mountains in the morning.

91. Vein (noun)

- Defination: A particular characteristic or tendency; a mood or style.
- Synonyms: streak, strain, tendency
- Antonyms: lack, absence, deviation
- Example: He spoke in a humorous vein throughout the evening.

92. Velocity (noun)

- Defination: The speed of something in a given direction.
- Synonyms: speed, pace, rate
- Antonyms: slowness, stagnation, inertia
- Example: The car reached maximum velocity on the open highway.

93. Vend (verb)



- Defination: To sell (something), especially on the street or from a stall.
- Synonyms: sell, peddle, hawk
- Antonyms: buy, purchase, acquire
- Example: Street vendors vend hotdogs and snacks at the event.

94. Vengeance (noun)

- Defination: Punishment inflicted or retribution exacted for an injury or wrong.
- Synonyms: revenge, retribution, reprisal
- Antonyms: forgiveness, mercy, pardon
- Example: He swore vengeance against those who had wronged him.

95. Vent (verb)

- Defination: To express or give a vent to (a strong emotion or feeling).
- Synonyms: express, release, air
- Antonyms: suppress, contain, hold back
- Example: She needed to vent her frustration after a stressful day.

96. Veracity (noun)

- Defination: Conformity to facts; accuracy; habitual truthfulness.
- Synonyms: truthfulness, accuracy, authenticity
- Antonyms: falsehood, deceit, dishonesty
- Example: The veracity of the witness's statement was questioned by the defense.

97. Verbose (adjective)

- Defination: Using or expressed in more words than are needed.
- Synonyms: wordy, loquacious, garrulous
- Antonyms: concise, succinct, brief
- Example: The speaker's verbose presentation lost the attention of the audience.

98. Verdure (noun)

- Defination: Green foliage; flourishing vegetation.
- Synonyms: foliage, greenery, lushness
- Antonyms: barrenness, desolation, aridness
- Example: The spring rains brought new verdure to the valley.

99. Viscous (adjective)

- Defination: Having a thick, sticky consistency between solid and liquid; having a high viscosity.
- Synonyms: thick, sticky, gloopy
- Antonyms: thin, watery, fluid
- Example: The syrup was thick and viscous, pouring slowly from the bottle.



100. Vindictive (adjective)

- Defination: Having or showing a strong or unreasoning desire for revenge.
- Synonyms: vengeful, rancorous, spiteful
- Antonyms: forgiving, merciful, lenient
- Example: His vindictive actions were driven by a long-held grudge.

101. Valorize (verb)

- Defination: To give or assign a value to (something); to enhance the value of by marketing or promotion.
- Synonyms: appreciate, enhance, promote
- Antonyms: devalue, disparage, depreciate
- Example: The government sought to valorize traditional crafts by supporting local artisans.

102. Vapidness (noun)

- Defination: The quality of being vapid; lack of liveliness or intellectual stimulation.
- Synonyms: dullness, blandness, monotony
- Antonyms: vibrancy, excitement, stimulation
- Example: The vapidness of the novel made it difficult to finish.

103. Velvet (adjective)

114. Vitiation (noun)

115. Vivacity (noun)

116. Vociferous (adjective)

121. Votive (adjective)

122. Vulcanize (verb)

133. Vivisection (noun)

- Defination: The practice of performing operations on live animals for the purpose of experimentation or scientific research.

134. Volitionary (adjective)

148. Victim (noun)

149. Vigil (noun)

150. Vigour (noun)
